From the Minister . . .

JANUARY RECEIVED ITS NAME from the Roman god Janus. He is the god of gates and doors, beginnings and endings. He is often depicted with two faces, one looking back to the past and one looking ahead to the future.



This image reflects our own behavior at this time of year. TV programs, newspapers and blogs are filled with the best and worst of 2008 in terms of dress, song, incidents and so forth. No doubt each of us may also be compiling our individual lists of what we'd like to see continue in 2009, and what we would be happier leaving behind.

As you move down your lists, I would like to suggest you include evaluating the following three questions.

1. *How is the vitality of your spirit?*
2. *How is the health of your connection with the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship?*
3. *What steps would renew your spirit and deepen your connection with us?*

I am also very interested in hearing your answers, if you would like a dialogue partner on these matters. If so, please call Nicole Luland, our Ministry Assistant, at 973-540-1177, and she will set it up.

When I meet with new members, we speak about what makes them want to connect with a congregation in the first place, and how they can sustain and enhance that relationship. People's responses are always varied. They may be seeking spiritually engaging worship, or religious education that opens the mind and expands the heart, or a group of friends with similar values and interests, or partners with whom to enact deeds of justice, love and compassion.

It is wise to think about these concerns when you join the Fellowship, and I would suggest they also deserve an annual review. What is it that you are seeking from your congregational involvement this year? How will you make time for these worthwhile needs?

A conversation on the topic of enhancing connections with the Fellowship with one of our longtime members, the Reverend Allen Wells, has led to an exciting

development. The Board of Trustees, Allen and I have come to a mutual agreement. Beginning in January, Allen will serve as an "Affiliated Minister" of the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship. UU Congregations around the country are developing similar relationships with community ministers working in varied settings, including hospitals, counseling centers, nonprofits and prisons.

This is a volunteer role, not a staff position, which recognizes Allen's prior professional experience in congregations and his current experience in the community. We hope this role will offer Allen and all of us in the congregation an opportunity to deepen our ministries together. He will be able to represent us at agreed-upon community initiatives and will play a supportive role in areas such as pastoral care and teaching. Those of you who are well acquainted with him are aware he does some of this already. Please join me and the Board in a special ritual of covenanting with him at our services on January 18. And you may read more about him on page 4.

Faith Developments

EVERY YEAR around this time I think about days gone by. Time really does fly. There was a time in my life when I itemized all that I wanted to accomplish for the New Year – the proverbial New Year’s Resolution list. On that list were my hopes to lose weight, exercise more, develop a spiritual practice, get up earlier, study more..... You get the picture.



For a child, writing out the resolutions might just be the first steps in developing a religious sense of growing personally, spiritually and emotionally. A first attempt at journaling? I posted the resolutions on my bulletin board as a child. As a young mother, I posted my resolutions on the refrigerator along with my children’s school pictures and crafts.

Throughout each year it occurred to me that I never lived up to my New Year’s Resolutions. And it became a source of failure. I liked the idea of writing my resolutions down, but I had no way of incorporating them into my life. I lacked the discipline necessary to accomplish what I had written. They had become fixed in stone. Year after year I repeated the same ritual of writing down my resolutions. And year

after year I met with the same feeling of failure. And then I stopped writing them down entirely.

It was at a Wisdom Circle Retreat many years ago that I discovered a different way to set my intentions for the year. Instead of writing the things we wanted to accomplish, we wrote down the things we wanted to let go of. A small epiphany had occurred. “This is much easier to accomplish,” I thought to myself. We tied our “letting go” writings onto sticks and sent them floating down the White River as part of a letting-go ritual. It was lovely. We watched them go down the winding river in the presence of all that beauty.

There is something else I discovered over the years in the process of growing in spirit. I didn’t need to wait until the New Year to set new intentions, to become more forgiving, to express gratitude, to find balance in my life, and to strive toward living in the present. I discovered that I need time everyday to journal, meditate, read something inspiring, light a candle, pray and, yes, exercise – just a little bit each day. My dog thanks me for the exercise part of my ritual!

May your New Year be set in the best of intentions, and may you and your family find personal time for developing rituals that will deepen your days throughout the year.

The Rev. Allen Wells, Our Affiliated Minister

Allen was born of Irish/English parents in Charlottesville, Va., under the shadow of Monticello. His great, great-grandfather was a friend of Thomas Jefferson. But Allen didn’t find out that Jefferson was a Unitarian until after he had converted from Presbyterianism to UUism, during his college years.

Allen first served as minister of UU congregations in Weymouth, Mass., Hollis, Queens, and at The First Unitarian Church of Brooklyn. Later he served as Director of Religious Education for the UU Congregation of Monmouth County and at the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship ca. 1978-82 .

In 1987 he opened the Allen Wells Center for Psychotherapy and Healing, a holistic mind/body spirit counseling center, in Morristown, which he directed for 12 years. Two years ago, he completed a four-year term as Consultant Minister of The First Unitarian Society of Rockland County, N.Y.

He holds a graduate degree in counseling from the University of Chicago, and a postgraduate degree in counseling from the Institute of Religion and Health in N.Y.C. Formerly a therapist of the DiMele Center for Counseling and Psychotherapy in mid-Manhattan, he is currently training in an intensive year-long Integrated Study Practice Program at the Barre Center for Buddhist Studies in Barre, Mass.

As a UU Buddhist psychotherapist, he specializes in the new field of Contemplative Psychotherapy.

Allen’s lifelong interest has been in bridging the internal, personal, psychological world, which we commonly call spiritual, and the external political, social, economic, environmental world, which we usually consider material. Allen finds himself at home on the picket line or on his zafu, teaching meditation. He acknowledges that he hasn’t written any books, because he says, he would rather spend the time ballroom dancing.

Beautification and Preservation Committee

Endowment Fund Takes More Conservative Tactic

A priority topic at this quarter's meeting of the Endowment Committee on December 18 was to review the Endowment Fund's investments during this period of financial uncertainty and ensure both proper, prudent management of its assets and preservation of its principal – the base funds that generous donors have contributed over the past few years.

Toward these objectives, we recently adjusted the Fund's investments to reflect a more conservative investment strategy – to an allocation of 67% fixed income (bonds), 32% equities (stocks) and 1% other from 31% bonds, 52% stocks and 17% other. This shift is expected to continue the preservation of principal while retaining some exposure to growth opportunities that stocks can provide and retaining our commitment to socially responsible investing.

SCAN Cabaret to Benefit Central America
 Saturday, January 31, 7:30 p.m.

The Service Committee Action Network's 23rd Annual Benefit Concert for Humanitarian Aid for Central America comes to MUF on Saturday evening, January 31. The evening is packed with great music and storytelling entertainment, including singer *Jean Rohe*, the indie music band *Matt Kanelos and The Smooth Maria*, the jazz band *Tyler, Schmidt and Spirig* and storyteller *Martin Dockery*.

Jean Rohe, who grew up in New Jersey singing folk music with her family, is welcomed back as an exciting soloist singing jazz and blues. A graduate of the New School Jazz program and its undergrad liberal arts division, Eugene Lang College, Jean has sung in venues throughout New York City, including the Birdland, Sweet Rhythm, the Cornelia Street Café, Detour, Barbés, and others, as well as venues on the west coast, in Canada, Cuba, and Brazil. In 2006 she won 2nd place as well as the audience choice award in the Shure Vocal Competition at the Montreux Jazz Festival in Switzerland.

Matt Kanelos & The Smooth Maria have recently emerged as an exciting and distinct voice in New York City's indie music scene. Kanelos' songs and singing (intimate in a way calling to mind Neil Young and Will Oldham) are the guiding force for a band with an uncommonly wide musical and emotional palate. With disarming grace, The Smooth Maria carries audiences through abstract yet vivid lyrical and musical landscapes. They perform regularly at acclaimed New York music venues like the Living Room, the Rockwood Music Hall, and Barbès. Matt released his first EP, *Children Love to Dance*, in 2005. He and the band (Joe Adamik of Califone, Ben Gallina, and Kyle Sanna) are currently working on their first full-length CD due for release in early 2009.

Tyler, Schmidt and Spirig is a trio composed of Josh Tyler, a singer/ songwriter/ guitarist and drummer; Robin Schmidt, guitarist; and Bernhard Spirig, bassist/ trumpeter. They play an assortment of standards and original compositions of high energy jazz, blues and funk.

Martin Dockery has recently completed a run of his extemporaneous monologue *Wanderlust* at the

Barrow Group in New York. He is a frequent performer in New York City's storytelling scene, appearing on the stages of *Speakeasy*, *Talkingstick*, *Mouthpiece*, *The Liar Show*, and is a seven-time finalist in *The Moth's* bi-annual *Grandslam Storytelling Championship*.

The Fellowship's Music Director, the inimitable Jim Blanton, will host the evening's entertainment.

While the Fellowship is transformed into a festive



cabaret, Jim Burchell, the quietly passionate Director of PeaceWorks, will just have returned from Nicaragua and will be on hand to relay the urgency and seriousness of the help needed. PeaceWorks, one of the organizations supported

by the concert, is a New Jersey-based nonprofit organization that collects and ships humanitarian aid to Nicaragua, El Salvador and Guatemala. Its most crucial work raises funds for groups in Nicaragua that work directly with street children in the city of Managua. PeaceWorks also supports efforts to reforest areas devastated by logging, protect declining watersheds, empower women through literacy and promote food security.

The annual concert, sponsored by the Fellowship's Social Committee Action Network (SCAN), also supports Doctors in Volunteer Service in Nicaragua, Peaceworks, Amnesty International and other nonprofit organizations.

The doors will open at 7:00 p.m. and the entertainment begins at 7:30 p.m. Light refreshments and non-alcoholic beverages are included (BYOB), and a 50/50 raffle will also support the cause. Tickets are \$20 in advance for unreserved seating, \$25 if purchased after January 25, and \$30 for reserved Patron seats.
