WHETHER YOU ARE A NEWCOMER, or you have been participating for five, 10, 20 or more years, you are a part of imagining the future of our spiritual home. Throughout 2009–2010, the Strategic Planning Task Force (SPTF) has created opportunities for you to share your vision, recommendations and passions, as well as listen to the vision, recommendations and passions of your fellow congregants.



You are an important part of the congregation, and we want to know what you would like to participate in and help to make happen in our future together.

No matter how long you have been a part of the congregation... no matter if you are enthusiastically involved or have been drifting of late... no matter if you are eight years, 48 years or 88 years old... no matter if you live close or farther away... no matter if you consider yourself to be of Western or Eastern European, Asian, Latino, African, Caribbean, North American descent or a mixture thereof... no matter if you are a banker, an actor, a doctor, an electrician, a teacher, a small-business owner, a social worker, an artist, a scientist... no matter if your spiritual growth is centered around god, the goddess, the earth, the best in humanity, the teachings of the Buddha or Emerson... your understanding of Unitarian Universalism and how the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship can live into this vision is vital.

In order to be successful, the SPTF needs to know what you are thinking and hoping for, and what excites you about the vision that is being generated. At the end of our strategic planning process, it is my hope that you will be eager to sign your name next to certain recommendations signifying that you want to help make them happen.

In the early fall, 150 members, staff and friends, as well as 80 children got together to express initial thoughts about the blessings we receive here, what we are proud of, what we are sorry about, and what we imagine is possible in five years. In the winter, the SPTF came back and shared what they learned through this process and named six areas to concentrate on in our strategic plan: facilities, deepening connections, leadership and stewardship, spiritual growth and worship, lifespan religious education, and our engagement with the world.

And now, at the very beginning of spring on **Sunday, March 21, at 1 p.m.**, you are invited to view a draft of the five-year vision statement, goals for the six identified areas, and some initial recommendations to fulfill these goals. There will also be an opportunity for you to offer recommendations to do your part in our shared work of creating a five-year plan. So please make the time to join us for this important next step. Our consultant Tillie-Jo will be back, lunch will be provided at noon, and childcare will be offered with an RSVP. The SPTF has thought of many logistics to make your participation easy and your time well spent. I hope you'll be there.

The President's Corner - Faith



I WOULD LIKE TO

BELIEVE that everyone who comes to the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship comes here as an act of faith. That is, that we all come here out of a great hope or trust that we will find what we are seeking in this

community. I know that I have an abundance of faith that each and every one of us will step up and support each other, support this congregation, this minister, this religious education program, this beacon of hope for people who are suffering in a myriad of ways.

It is that faith that motivates me to stand at the front door to greet as many people who come to the Fellowship as possible. I am truly thankful for each person who comes through our doors: the adults, the children, the young adults, the teenagers, the babies; the members, the visitors, the newcomers, the old-comers, the staff members, our professional staff and the ton of volunteers who make up our community.

It is also my strong faith in our community that helps inform my choices as President on what items to ask the Board to consider and in deciding how much commitment I can ask of myself and others.

People often remark to me that their perception of the position of President at MUF is that it is very time-intensive, difficult and thankless. Rather, I find that deepening my commitment to believing in you, believing in our seven principles and believing that together we can build a better community has filled me with gratitude. I have found our congregation to express their gratitude constantly, and in so many beautiful ways.

In the coming months and year, our community is providing each of you with an opportunity to deepen your faith and your commitment. We need to strengthen the financial ministry of our congregation. We have embarked on an effort to redefine and reorganize how we do our pledging and stewardship functions. This needs to be a year-round ministry of education, communication and gratitude.

The Science of Music Comes to MUF Saturday, March 27, 7 p.m.

Why do wooden instruments sound different from metal instruments? Why is the sound different when striking a drum with a hard mallet as opposed to a soft mallet?

The *Science of Music* program for all ages will examine the fascinating relationship of music and science. Performers Chris Lance, trumpet; Todd Van Gordon, clarinet; Beth Wilson, piano, and Jim Harp, percussion, will join host Dr. Jim Blanton to perform short musical pieces in diverse styles to demonstrate the principles of sound and vibration, and will show how the quality of sound is affected by shape and material. Audience members will accompany the performers using claps, snaps and lap slaps, and will construct and play along on a "Canobottlephone" (metal soda cans, plastic and glass bottles).

Peacemaking Statement on GA Agenda

UU congregations nationwide voted to place the Peacemaking Statement of Conscience on the agenda of General Assembly (GA) this coming summer. The poll also asked congregations to prioritize the following six social justice topics that had been previously nominated by UUs throughout the country, toward the goal of narrowing down the selection for the next Congregational Study Action Issue (CSAI).

These are the results of that recent polling. The first five have now been nominated to be presented at GA in June 2010:

ENERGY, PEACE, & JUSTICE - 33%
NATIONAL ECONOMIC REFORM: A MORAL IMPERATIVE - 31%
IMMIGRATION AS A MORAL ISSUE - 31%
ENDING SLAVERY - 29%
REVITALIZING AMERICAN DEMOCRACY - 25 %
NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT - 18%

The top vote-getter at GA will be studied for the next four years as the next CSAI. It looks like a close race!

Notes from the Food Pantry – Interfaith Food Pantry of Morris County Mission: To distribute supplemental and/or emergency nonperishable food to eligible Morris County residents in need; to provide hands on opportunities for neighbors to help neighbors; to educate public about the issues of hunger in our area. Rosemary Gilmartin, Exec. Director, reports:

- In 2009 they served 5,007 households, 400 per week – feeding a total of 13,036 people.
- They distributed 780,160 pounds of food; 15,000 per week.
- Client ethnicity: 51% Hispanic/Latino; 33% Caucasian, 12% African American 4% other.
- According to the United Way of Morris County: “30% of the families living in Morris County are earning less than they need to support their families and are struggling to provide food for them.”
- Income Sources: Salary/wages: 53%; SSI: 10%; SS Pension: 8%; Disability 8%; Unemployment: 6%; Public Assistance: 3%; Child Support/Other: 1% No Income: 6%.
- Age: 18 and under: 40%; 60 and over: 10%

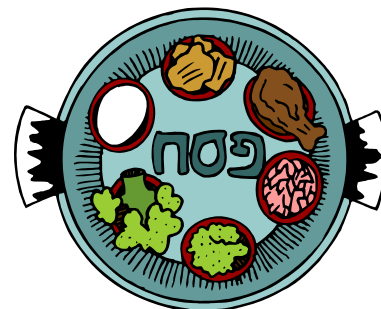
