From the Minister . . .

WELCOME TO THE START of what I hope will be a vibrant year as partners in ministry together at the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship. There are many plans in the works, and I can't wait to see you at our homecoming services on September 7.



There is one group of volunteers, in particular, who have been hard at work planning and interviewing that I would like to thank at the beginning of this year. I want to thank my partners in the search for a new Director of Religious Education—Elizabeth Bain, Ken Nemeth, Edith Ng, David Palmer and Janine Torsiello. We are greatly anticipating the opportunity for you to meet Karen Brown on her first day with us, September 14.

I also want to share with you the theme of the year: “Out of Many, One.” This theme jumped out at me during my summer study leave both as essential to Unitarian Universalism’s core assertions and as especially important during a year when several developments are occurring in our congregation and in society at large.

- We are a religious tradition which rejects the notion of separating peoples into the saved and the unsaved. We affirm that all of our destinies are intertwined, and our task is to help bring peace, justice and wholeness into being for all.
- We, as members of this community, are taking the several mission statements groups of you discussed and wrote last year and creating one visionary snapshot statement of who we are to today.
- We are also doing the work of discernment as we explore the various paths our congregation can take in the next few years, and then learning how to choose. (The green-growth architecture competition we are currently hosting, thanks to the work of Walter Kanzler, is a step towards

imagining that future. Keep posted for a date in October.)

- We, as members of the larger United States, in preparation for the upcoming elections are asking ourselves who the wise leader is to help us create policy decisions that will lead to the common good. (We are not, nor should we be, in the business of endorsing candidates at MUF. That is the important work of others. However, we can ask what the ethical and spiritual dimensions are of the issues that face our society? We should create the space to reflect thoughtfully on our values, and how they impact our decisions in every aspect of our lives.)

You will be invited to engage with the topic of “Out of Many, One” through sermons, at our leadership retreat, in children’s and adults’ educational and social justice programs, and other opportunities throughout the year. My brief statements above only begin to capture the possibilities, and I welcome hearing your thoughts on how we can explore this theme together.

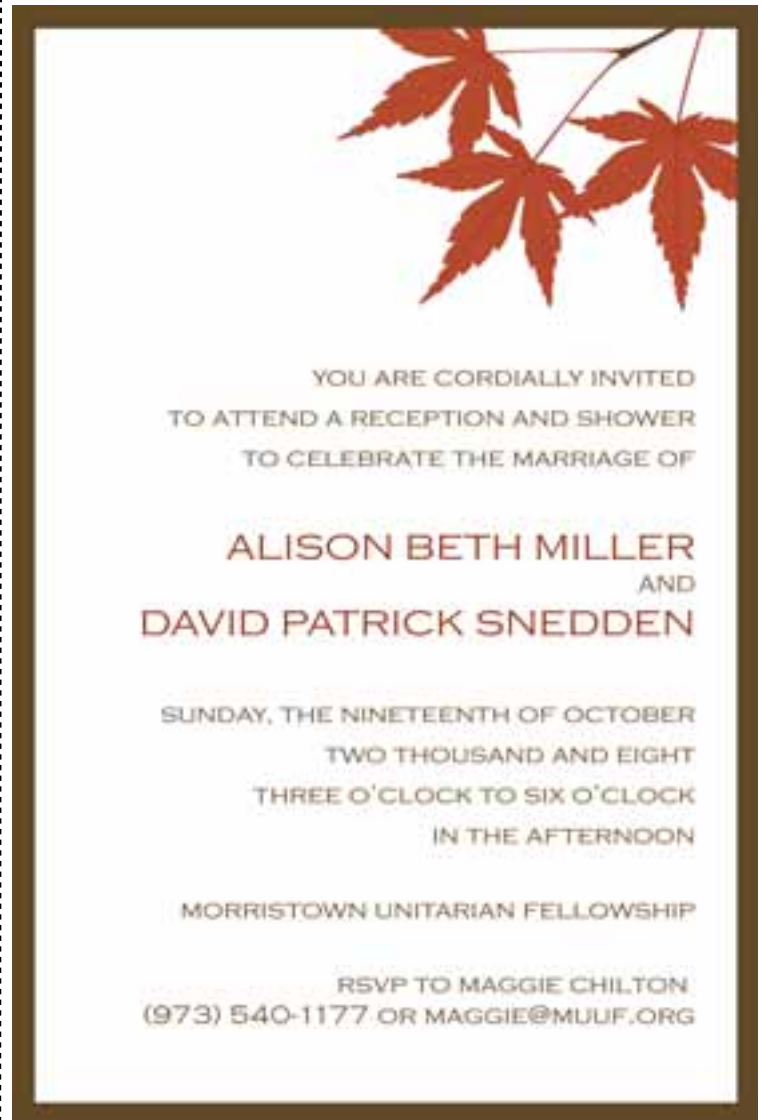

Bob Marcus Turns Author

Former MUFer Bob Marcus has published a new book, *A Priest, a Minister, and a Rabbi*, now available from the *Lulu.com* publishing company. In a few weeks it will also be available at *Amazon.com*, Borders and other book stores accessible through the web.

The book is 8 1/2" x 11", and has about 280 pages. It is a collection of jokes and other wit & humor that Bob has collected over the years, with a big boost from all the e-mailings he's received since the mid-'90's.

He decided to use one of the newer web-based "do-it-yourself" publishing companies which seem to be growing in popularity. This is "just-in-time" publishing which needs no inventory. Once an order is received, the book is printed, bound and shipped out within a few days.

The only down side is the cost. The buyer pays \$20.50 for the book, and if you buy from *Amazon.com*, for example, his return is a magnificent 85 cents.

But buy it anyway! (From *Lulu.com* now--from *Amazon.com* and the others in a few weeks.)

Front Gate Wall Restoration Complete

The Beautification and Preservation Committee has completed restoring the front gate wall and six adjacent columns. Funded by the Endowment Committee and a generous member, the work involved a complete repointing of the lower wall bricks, replacement of several worn and missing bricks and spot-pointing of the six columns. This work should ensure that the wall and posts last another 100 years and provides a solid structure for the future restoration of the front gate and fence ironwork.

As funds are available, future restoration work will be directed at the front gate and fence, the two 'wing' walls on either side of the front gate wall, the Service Court wall and the east and west low garden 'baluster' walls.
